

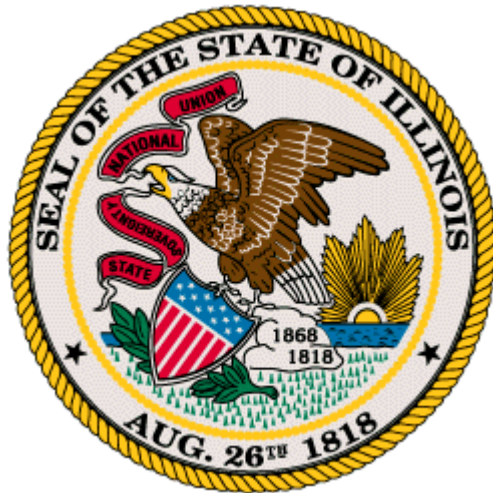

# COMPLIANCE MONITORING POLICY AND PROCEDURE MANUAL

Revised September 2009

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## **Legal & Administrative Policies Authorizing Monitoring**

Pursuant to Section 223(a)(14) of the JJDP Act, the State must provide for an adequate system of monitoring jails, lockups, detention facilities, correctional facilities and non-secure facilities to ensure that the core protections are met.

The Illinois Department of Corrections (DOC) has the statutory authority to write standards and inspect so that those standards are met. That authority is described in Chapter 730ILCS5/3-15-2 (Unified Code of Corrections) and also sets out DOC responsibilities when non-compliance with standards is found. The DOC standards quote the statutory language granting their standard setting and inspection authority in all three sets of standards. While the standards do not layout a process for taking complaints, DOC does require that facilities report unusual occurrences as defined in the standards. In practice, DOC does investigate all complaints of violations they receive.

The Department of Human Services (DHS) under PA89-0507 (HB2632) is authorized and empowered to discharge any and all responsibilities imposed on such bodies by the federal Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 2002 (copy sent to OJJDP) as amended, specifically the deinstitutionalization of status offenders, site and sound separation of juveniles and adults in county and municipal jails, removal of juveniles from county and municipal jails prior to six hours and monitoring of compliance with these core requirements.

In addition the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts (AOIC) has the authority described in Chapter 730 ILCS 110/15 to reimburse counties for salaries of detention staff. They further have the authority to monitor and evaluate programs operated by Probation and Court Services Departments (including detention where positions are subsidized).

The DOC standards require that facilities file monthly population reports. AOIC is authorized to develop a system of record keeping and to gather statistics and establish uniform laws. DHS is the funding source and compliance monitor.

The Juvenile Monitoring Information System (JMIS); is partnered by DOC, DHS and AOIC.

## **Section 3- Plans for compliance with the First Three Core-Requirements of the JDPa Act And the State's Plan for Compliance Monitoring**

### **3A- Plan for Deinstitutionalization of Status Offenders**

No minor accused of a status offense (an act that would not be criminal if committed by an adult) may be securely detained in a jail, lockup or juvenile detention center. Examples of status offenses are truancy, running away, curfew violations, underage drinking and being ungovernable. An exception is granted for status offenders detained for violation of a valid court order. This requirement also extends to non-offenders, children who fall under the Juvenile Court Act who are abused, neglected and/or dependent. Under the rules of the exception, the state has to prove that the original court order was valid, that the minor had received all of his/her rights under the Gault decision, that the minor had been ordered to do or not to do something, that conditions of the order had been given orally in a court and in writing, and that the minor had been admonished that violation of the court's order could result in detention. Prior to being ordered into detention for contempt of court, the case would also have to be reviewed by a group, not composed of court employee or police officials, to assure that all other means of dealing with the juveniles had been exhausted. The judge is not bound by the group's recommendation.

At present, Illinois is not in violation and therefore does not use this valid court order exception. Illinois instead counts the status and non-offenders detained for contempt of court as violations of the Act. Staff continues to monitor the contempt of court violations to see if Illinois needs to prepare to use the valid court order exception.

#### Status

Illinois continues to be in compliance with the Deinstitutionalization of Status Offenders core requirement.

In 2007, 2008 and 2009, Illinois was in compliance with the DSO core requirement and DSO violations have been decreasing. Illinois reported that it had no DSO violations in jail or lockup facilities these years.

In 2007, violations in juvenile detention centers totaled 52. Ten counties out of seventeen with Juvenile detention centers accounted for all 52 violations (truancy 12, non offenders 18 and other 22). Illinois' de minimis figure for compliance in 2007 was 188 violations.

In 2008, violations in juvenile detention centers totaled 50. Ten counties out of seventeen with Juvenile detention centers accounted for all 50 violations (truancy 24, non offenders 7 and other 19). Illinois' de minimis figure for compliance in 2008 was 188 violations

In 2009, violations in juvenile detention centers totaled 41. Ten counties out of seventeen with Juvenile detention centers accounted for all 41 violations (truancy 19, non offenders 7 and other 15). Illinois' de minimis figure for compliance in 2009 was 182 violations.

### Plan to Maintain Compliance Status

Illinois has worked diligently to become compliant with the DSO core requirement of the JJDP Act. Illinois continues to ensure it will maintain compliance through a variety of strategies:

1. The Illinois Juvenile Justice Commission (IJJC) is concentrating its efforts on those six counties that accounted for 84 percent of the detention of status offenders in juvenile detention centers. IJJC staff have found that meeting in person with key stakeholders in the juvenile detention process helps to educate persons on detention alternatives and development of additional resources. As IJJC staff conducts local meetings, attempts are made to involve the detention center leadership, juvenile probation, the judiciary, state's attorney and public defender. Community service providers are involved in subsequent discussions and planning efforts, as needed.
2. The Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) has previously funded four projects designed to prevent status offenders from being detained in a secure setting. The pilot projects were chosen based upon the community need and the high number of DSO violations exhibited in each targeted community. IDHS intends to continue to use strategies such as these to address issues in newly identified counties as appropriate, as their success is evident by the overall compliance of the state.
3. The IJJC is working in partnership with the Illinois Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative Partners Group to address these issues on multiple fronts. Site visits, technical assistance opportunities, capacity building efforts, and more are part of the approach to address the DSO issues in the counties.
4. The IJJC is also beginning to work closely with the education community regarding truancy issues. In some Illinois communities, truants are court-ordered to attend school. If the youth does not attend school then it is a contempt of court and sometimes the youth is detained. IJJC is interested in working with the Illinois State Board of Education and Regional Superintendent of Schools offices to develop alternatives to holding truants in secure detention. The Illinois State Board of Education has been invited to attend the Juvenile Detention Alternatives Symposiums in the past where truancy alternatives were addressed and the IJJC will continue to explore ways of working collaboratively with ISBE around this issue.

### **3B - Plan for Separation of Juveniles from Adult Offenders**

Juveniles alleged to be or found to be delinquent, status offenders, and non-offenders shall not have contact with adult persons who are incarcerated because they have been convicted of a crime or are awaiting trial on criminal charges. The separation of juveniles from adults must be both by sight and sound.

There were no changes to plan for Separation. However, an update of Illinois current status is provided below.

#### Status

Illinois has a strong history of being in compliance with the separation requirements of the JJDP Act. Before the core requirements of the Act were established, the state had statutorily mandated

that adult and juvenile offenders be held sight and sound separate. In 2007, 2008 and 2009 there were no findings of non-compliance with the separation requirement.

#### Plan to Maintain Compliance

Illinois continues to devote significant resources towards compliance monitoring activities. The activities to ensure the state maintains compliance with the separation requirement are the same as described in the compliance monitoring section of this plan. The IJJC believes that by having the compliance monitoring function address several core requirements it is a more efficient use of resources.

### **3C - Plan for Removal of Juveniles from Adult Jail and Lockups**

Currently in Illinois the six-hour hold exception is utilized. Illinois is in compliance with the Jail Removal requirement and violations have been decreasing. The rural removal and transfer/waiver exceptions are not utilized.

Juveniles accused of committing acts which would be not be criminal for adults are not to be securely detained in jails or lockups. A rule of reason is applied, allowing alleged delinquents to be detained for up to six hours for the purpose of investigation and identification. The clock starts the moment a juvenile is placed into a locked setting. This includes any locked room, or when a juvenile is handcuffed to a stationary object. At the end of the six hours the juvenile must be released or transferred to a juvenile detention center.

Prior to the year 2000, Illinois had been using the old interpretation that once the clock started, it could not be stopped until the juvenile was released from custody, even if the juvenile was removed from the locked setting. Starting in 2000, Illinois began using a new interpretation of the rule approved by OJJDP stating that once the clock starts it can be stopped once the juvenile is permanently removed from the locked setting.

The Illinois Juvenile Court Act was rewritten with many provisions becoming effective in 1999. One new provision is in direct conflict with the Jail Removal requirement of the JJDP Act. The new provision permits county jails and municipal lockups to detain minors 12 years of age and older up to 12 hours, unless the offense is a crime of violence, in which case the minor may be detained up to 24 hours. This new provision was a key factor in Illinois' lack of compliance with the jail removal requirement in 1999.

#### Status

Illinois continues to be in compliance with the jail removal core requirement.

In 2007, 39 county jails and 176 municipal lockups in Illinois securely detained juveniles. Of these, 12 county jails and 27 municipal lockups exceeded the six-hour limit at least once, resulting in 160 violations (51 in county jails and 109 in municipal lockups). The de minimis Number for Illinois is 274.

In 2008, 39 county jails and 176 municipal lockups in Illinois securely detain juveniles.

Of these, 13 county jails and 30 municipal lockups exceeded the six-hour limit at least once, resulting in 183 violations (62 in county jails and 121 in municipal lockups). The de minimis number for Illinois is 274.

In 2009, 12 county jails and 25 municipal lockups exceeded the six hour limit at least once, resulting in 163 violations (50 in county jails and 113 in municipal lockups). The de minimis number for Illinois is 274.

#### Plan to Maintain Compliance

Illinois has developed a number of strategies to come into compliance with the jail removal core requirement and will continue with a number of these efforts.

1. Illinois expanded the number of juvenile detention beds by 46 percent (694 beds to 1,282 beds) from 1989 to 2005. This has resulted in less reliance on the use of county jails and municipal lockups to detain juveniles. In fact, Illinois has gone from not enough detention beds to having an excess of detention beds.

- IJJC continues to support jail removal efforts in rural areas by approving grants to transport juveniles from rural counties to juvenile detention centers elsewhere in the state. Currently, there are four grantees located strategically throughout the state. Certain parts of the state are three or four hours from a detention center. Without transportation programs county sheriff's departments would have the responsibility of transporting minors for the detention hearings. One or two deputies could be occupied for their entire shift. A number of rural counties may only have two deputies working at one time. The transportation grants help offset this expense and ensure the youth can be held in a juvenile detention center, as opposed to county jail, and still be present for a detention hearing.
- IJJC has made a strong commitment to developing alternatives to detention throughout Illinois. As alternatives to detention are developed it will allow more juveniles to remain in their community in non-secure settings. This directly impacts a reduction in the detention of juveniles in county jails and municipal lockups. The alternatives to detention emphasis in Illinois originally began almost a decade ago when Cook County was chosen by the Annie E. Casey Foundation as a site to implement detention alternatives strategies. At that time, the Cook County Juvenile Detention Center was chronically overcrowded. After unparalleled success in Cook County many of the lessons learned have been adopted by IJJC with the goal of replicating similar projects throughout Illinois. One of the critical foundations of IJJC detention alternatives work has been to realize that what may work in Cook County may not work in another county. Each community has its unique issues, resources and challenges. IJJC is working in partnership with communities to develop detention alternatives.

The IJJC has supported the Illinois Probation and Court Services Association to co-sponsor an Alternatives to Detention Symposium in conjunction with the Annie E. Casey Foundation. The Symposium has been held annually with over 50 counties attending. The format of the Symposium is for participating counties to send teams of key stakeholders (i.e. juvenile judge, juvenile probation director, state's attorney, detention center director, etc.) to

participate. Throughout the Symposium the teams are encouraged to develop strategies that can be used in their community.

- ❑ The IJC has contracted with the National Juvenile Detention Association to provide a model annual detention report. The report, *The Status of Juvenile Detention in Illinois: Model Annual Report* has been done annually with the last version done in the fall of 2003. The report is widely disseminated and is used to educate key policy makers and the public in current detention practices. It is expected that this report will continue.
- ❑ The Commission along with the Department of Human Services continues to actively support proposed legislation to bring the state back in line with the core requirements of the Federal JJDP Act. In particular, as it pertains to this core requirement, Illinois law currently allows for a youth between 12 and 17 years of age to be held in a secure lockup for up to 12 hours, unless the offense is a crime of violence in which case the minor may be detained up to 24 hours. This is of course, in direct violation of the Federal JJDP Act.

### **3D - Plan for Compliance Monitoring**

To adequately report compliance with the core requirements of the JJDP Act data must be collected from all facilities where juveniles are placed while they are under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Court Act. The data is used to determine the State's compliance with the core requirements that:

- ❑ No status or non offenders are securely detained;
- ❑ Adult and juvenile offenders are detained sight and sound separate from each other;
- ❑ Juvenile offenders are detained in jails and lock ups for no more than six hours;
- ❑ The problem of disproportionate incarceration of minority youth is identified and addressed

#### Activities and Timetables

Illinois has successfully implemented a coordinated strategy to monitor compliance with the JJDP Act. The Illinois Juvenile Justice Commission, which is housed within the Illinois Department of Human Services, works closely with the Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC), the Illinois Department of Juvenile Justice (IDJJ) and the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts (AOIC) to monitor compliance. Staff from the IDOC, IDJJ and IDHS gather information, classify the facilities and inspect the facilities. As issues arise at local facilities, the AOIC is often included in the discussion and development of a strategy with the local facility to maintain compliance.

Compliance monitoring activities and use of timetables occur continuously throughout the three-year grant cycle. Secure facilities that hold juveniles are inspected annually. Detention monitoring is accomplished through self-reporting by secure facilities to the Juvenile Monitoring and Information System (JMIS, and since moving to a web-based platform in 2003/2004 is now referred to as JMIS), review of IDOC and IDJJ inspection reports and on-site visits conducted periodically by IDOC, IDJJ and IDHS staff to verify both the self-reported data and sight and sound separation. The IDHS coordinates all elements of the reporting system as well as operates the JMIS, the automated data collection system for not only IDOC and IDHS but also the AOIC and the IDJJ.



IDOC and IDJJ will continue to use its legislative authority to conduct on-site inspections and monitor state laws and regulations. The data reported on JMIS and the data collected by IDOC and IDJJ are verified on-site through a grant to IDOC and IDJJ. IDOC and staff visit jails, municipal lockups as well as facilities such as airport authorities, Illinois State Police headquarters, large shopping malls and sports arenas. IDJJ staff visit juvenile detention centers and IYC facilities.

During on-site visits IDOC and IDJJ staff also provide technical assistance to facilities in coming into compliance with JJDP Act requirements and clarify reporting errors found in the jmis.

The IDHS compliance monitor is responsible for overseeing the process, coordinating with other state agencies and compiling data collected by IDOC, IDJJ and JMIS. The compliance monitor Assists in the updating and development of the JMIS computer program, provides technical assistance to local agencies, maintains monitoring data and drafts the compliance monitoring report.

As indicated in the enclosed budget, Illinois is allocating \$275,000 towards compliance monitoring activities.

### **1.Barriers and Strategies**

**Barrier** > Legislation in Illinois, Public Act 90-0579, which took effect January 1, 1999, allows for minors aged 10-12 to be detained by police for up to hours, and age 13-17 for up to 12 hours, and 24 hours if a crime of violence is involved. While the six hours still applies to municipal lockups and some county jails. This is a direct violation of the Federal JJDP Act.

**Strategy** > The Commission along with the Department of Human Services continues to actively support proposed legislation to bring the state back in line with the core requirements of the Federal JJDP Act.

Through the use of technical assistance, juvenile officer training conferences, close and consistent on-site monitoring of secure holding facilities and strict enforcement of Federal Core Requirement definitions in the monitoring process, violations can be held below the states de minimus of 270. DHS ensures that grant funded IDOC and IDJJ monitoring staff is at full capacity and they are continually trained to monitor the expanding Monitoring universe.

That the JMIS reporting system is used by all secure holding facilities and that monitors checked JMIS reports with facility logs to insure accuracy in monitoring.

**Barrier** > Failure of some reporting facilities continues to be a problem, due to the following reasons: Detention practices have changed. In some facilities that were reporting to JMIS in the past no longer detain juveniles, in some cases facilities that did not securely hold juvenile now do. Also changes in reporting personnel caused by layoffs, promotions and retirement affect the reporting process.

Some facilities report all youths arrested or taken into custody rather than only those youth securely detained. Data received from some facilities is sometime incomplete or questionable. Some secure hold facilities that do not detain juveniles in a given month, fail to file a report for that month. Finally, training regarding use of eJMIS has not been consistent and frequent.

**Strategy** > The above barriers can be corrected by continuing to provide technical assistance, constant and frequent JMIS training, juvenile officers conference training and on sight monitoring visits and keeping IDOC, IDJJ monitoring staff at its full compliment.

Finally, DHS has hired another Compliance Monitor to keep up with the expanding Monitoring Universe, to closely monitor, provide technical assistance training to facilities having the above problems and assure that 100% of juvenile detention centers, 50% of the jails and lockups that hold juveniles and 50% of IDJJ youth centers are monitored annually to assure quality compliance.

**Barrier**> Prior to 1989, Illinois had 649 beds in juvenile detention center causing jails and lockups to hold juveniles in there facilities longer than the 6 hour jail removal requirement. Illinois does not use the rural exception.

**Strategy**> Since 1989, Illinois has increased its juvenile detention bed space to 1,282 beds through new construction and additional bed space in existing facilities. The IJJC continues to support jail removal through the state by developing and supporting four transportation grants to juvenile detention centers from rural counties located strategically through out the state. This cuts down the amount of time juveniles are held and the financial travel burdens incurred by smaller rural counties with few deputies available to transport.

**Barrier**> Illinois had chronically lacked detention alternatives and strategies causing overcrowding in detention center throughout the state, especially in Cook County (who at one time had housed 850 juveniles for a period of several months with a 495 bed capacity).

**Strategy**> IJJC continues to have a strong commitment to develop alternatives to detention Through out Illinois and as these alternatives are developed more juveniles are allowed to remain in their community in non-secure settings (for detailed more information re: alternatives see plan to maintain compliance under 3C Plan for Removal of Juveniles from Adult Jail and Lockups).

## **2. Identification of the Monitoring Universe**

The state must identify all public and private residential facilities in which juveniles could be placed under the Illinois Juvenile Court Act. IDOC and IDJJ are the exclusive sources of identifying and classifying public secure residential facilities that would be monitored for compliance with the JJDP Act. An updated Master Universe List for jails, municipal lockups, Detention centers and IDJJ facilities are compiled by IDOC and IDJJ after on-site inspection and the list is submitted to IDHS. The list is computerized, reviewed by above agencies and updated regularly. The list has seven data elements (facility, report to eJMIS, holds juveniles securely, source of inspections, last date of inspection and next scheduled date of inspection, public or private facility and juvenile and or adult).

IDOC has four field staff who dedicates 50 percent of their time to monitoring jails, municipal lockups and other facilities for juvenile core requirements and state juvenile standards and one support service person at 100 percent of time.

IDJJ has one field staff monitoring juvenile detention centers and IYC facilities 100 percent of time for above requirements

## **3. Classification of Facilities**

Facilities must be classified to determine which ones should be considered as secure. Secure detention is defined as placing a juvenile in a locked room or cell or handcuffing him/her to a stationary object. IDOC performs on-site inspections which include walking through the facilities as a juvenile would while being processed and reviewing facility detention logs in order to determine if a facility is secure or non-secure. If secure, the facility reports to eJMIS. A reporting

exemption is made for facilities that have an approved written policy stating that juveniles are not securely detained. Secure facilities policies are checked annually to assure that there have been no changes. When “no hold” facilities securely detain a juvenile they are required to file an unusual incident report to IDOC. IDOC and the IDHS compliance monitors provide technical assistance in developing appropriate no hold policies for facilities when requested.

All IDJJ facilities securely hold juveniles (juvenile detention and IYC youth centers) and technical assistance is provided to them when needed.

The current classification of facilities in Illinois includes:

#### **4. Inspection of Facilities**

Inspection of facilities is necessary to ensure an accurate assessment of each facility’s classification and record keeping. After initial on-site visits, facilities that hold securely receive an annual inspection. The IDOC inspection includes: 1) A review of the physical accommodations to determine whether it is a secure or non-secure facility and whether adequate sight or sound separation between juvenile and adult offenders exists. 2) A review of the record keeping system to determine whether sufficient data are maintained to determine compliance with the JJDP Act. 3) A review of non-secure facilities “no hold” policies to determine if an exemption are appropriate. 4) Provision of technical assistance to bring facilities into compliance.

IDJJ follows the same process re: sight and sound separation, record keeping and for compliance violations.

In 2006 staff from the IDOC visited 444 full and part-time municipal lockups, 67 county jails and 17 juvenile detention centers. IDOC also conducted approximately 44 on-site technical assistance visits.

In 2007 staff from the IDOC visited 456 full and part-time municipal lockups, 92 county jails and 17 juvenile detention centers. IDHS monitor visited 5 JJ Youth Centers. IDOC also conducted approximately 44 on-site technical assistance visits.

In 2008 staff from the IDOC visited 357 full and part-time municipal lockups and 88 county jails. IDJJ monitor visited 17 juvenile detention centers and 4 youth centers. IJJC will continue to utilize the services and expertise of IDOC and IDJJ to monitor compliance with all three of the core requirements.

The purpose of on-site visits by the compliance monitor is to verify data already collected on eJMIS or by IDJJ and is not intended to be an inspection. For example, the compliance monitor does not look at the size of the detention cells, menus, bed structure, etc. as IDJJ might on an inspection visit. The compliance monitor tours the facility and reviews logs to reconcile them with eJMIS/IDJJ data and tracks how juveniles move through the facility to document sight and sound separation.

### **5. Violation Procedures**

When IDOC or IDJJ find violations, the governing board (county board or city council) and administrator (sheriff, police chief, chief judge or superintendent) is notified in writing. If the violation is serious, IDOC or IDJJ may conduct a follow-up inspection 60 to 90 days later. If the violation continues, IDOC or IDJJ may ask the Attorney General to file suit against the county or municipality asking that the court grant an injunction to stop the violation.

### **6. Data Collection and Verification**

This is the actual collection and reporting of data to determine whether the facility is in compliance with the core requirements. Compliance monitoring is accomplished through self-reporting by secure facilities to eJMIS and review of IDOC and IDJJ inspection reports covering a 12-month period. Therefore, the data must be verified.

The IDHS operates eJMIS. eJMIS was originally designed in 1978 to monitor compliance with deinstitutionalization of status offenders, but has been updated to include the other core requirements. At a minimum, information is requested on each individual detained and currently includes age, race, sex, alleged offense, date and time of intake, date and time of detention hearing and date and time of release. In the past couple years, the system was moved to a web-based platform whereby detention centers are able to enter data into the computer on a daily basis, thereby allowing for data to be gathered to generate current reports in various combinations for different purposes. The system now referred to as eJMIS, is the only source for information on length of detention and presenting offense, which is essential for addressing compliance with length of detention and presenting offense, which is essential for addressing compliance with DSO and Jail Removal requirements. It is also the only source for information on racial breakdown of youth detained for determining the over representation of minority youth in incarceration. All juvenile detention centers are required to utilize this system.

IDOC and IDJJ have statutory authority and have acted on that authority to inspect, approve, monitor and set training standards for county jails and municipal lockups, juvenile detention centers and youth centers that have applied under the law as holding facilities. The IJJC compliance monitor has assisted IDOC and IDJJ in verifying state standard compliance with the new act and will provide technical assistance to facilities becoming collocated.

The data reported on eJMIS and the data collected by IDOC and IDJJ are verified on-site. At present all secure holding facilities report to eJMIS. IDOC and IDJJ staff ensures compliance by on-site visits. Both IDOC and IDJJ have adopted the eJMIS data reporting form, as its monthly report form and each month jails, lockups and detention centers which securely detain juveniles, are to report to eJMIS. At present, only detention centers report on eJMIS.

The compliance monitor is responsible for these processes, coordinating with other state agencies and analyzing data collected by IDOC, IDJJ and eJMIS. The compliance monitor assists in the updating and development of the eJMIS computer program and electronic transfer of data provides technical assistance to local agencies and maintains monitoring data and drafts the compliance monitoring report.

### **7. Role of the State Advisory Group**

At each of the quarterly IJJC meetings, a monitoring compliance report is presented. The IJJC (Illinois' State Advisory Group (SAG)) is also provided with an annual compliance report for each of the four core requirements. The reports identify the core requirements, provide a summary of the current status, and include supporting documentation.

Individual IJJC Commissioners are also involved in working with local government agencies in the event that compliance issues become a concern. For example, one county may be inappropriately holding status offenders in secure detention. The IJJC then discusses strategies to help the county improve in this area. One strategy may be that a Commissioner who is well respected by county officials convenes a meeting with IDHS staff, county juvenile justice staff and other stakeholders to identify ways to reduce the number of status offender confinements.

In addition, IJJC has adopted the following policies:

- a. Applicants and grantees must be in full compliance with the four core requirements of the JJDP Act in order to receive IJJC funds.
- b. Grantees must report any finding of non-compliance with the four core requirements to the IJJC within 15 days of discovery. If notified within the 15 days, then the IJJC will work with the jurisdiction to correct the situation and prevent further incidents of non-compliance. If notified after 15 days, IJJC will treat non-compliance as a violation of the core requirements and consider termination of grant funding for that grantee.

### **8. Assurance to Maintain Compliance**

Illinois has worked hard over the last three years to maintain compliance with the core requirements of the JJDP Act. Plans to monitor the state's compliance are on file and status reports reflected in IJJC meeting minutes. The resources to be allocated toward compliance monitoring are reflected in the state's application for Formula funding, and contracts for compliance monitoring activities are written and on file. In the event resources for compliance monitoring are lost and would jeopardize Illinois' ability to stay in compliance, the OJJDP will be notified and a plan presented.

# Definition of Terms

**The State of Illinois certifies that in cases where the state and federal definitions differ that the federal definition is and will be used in the monitoring process.**

Term	Definition
Abused child	Any child whose parent, family member, or any person responsible for the child's welfare inflicts or creates a substantial risk of physical or mental injury; or commits or allows to be committed any sex offense or torture against such child; or inflicts excessive corporal punishment.
Active probation caseload	The total workload of open juvenile cases in a court services' department at a given point in time. The active caseload includes probation cases, supervision cases, cases continued under supervision, and informal supervision cases.
Adjudicated delinquent	Anyone prior to their 17 <sup>th</sup> birthday that has been found by the Juvenile court to have violated or attempted to violate any federal or state law, or county or municipal ordinance.
Adjudicatory hearing (adjudication)	A court-based hearing to determine whether the allegations of a petition are supported. In the case of abused, neglected, or dependent minors, addicted minors, and minors requiring authoritative intervention (MRAI), a preponderance of the evidence is the standard applied. In the case of delinquency, the allegations of a petition that a minor is delinquent (has committed a delinquent offense) must be proved beyond a reasonable doubt. An adjudication is a finding of guilt filed with the court. Effective January 1, 1999, the term "trial" replaced "adjudicatory hearing" in delinquency proceedings.
Admission	The entry of a juvenile offender into the temporary care of a secure custody facility. The minor is alleged to be or has been adjudicated delinquent and requires secure custody for the minor's own protection (or the community's protection) in a facility designed to physically restrict the minor's movements pending disposition by the court or execution of an order of the court for placement or commitment.
Adult jail	A locked facility, administered State, county or local law enforcement and correctional agencies, the purpose of which is to detain adults charged with violating criminal law, pending trial. Also considered as adult jails are those facilities used to hold convicted adult criminal offenders sentenced for less than 1 year
Adult jail Removal Illinois	Youth 12 years or older may be held up to 40 hours in an adult county jail, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and court designated holidays, and must be kept separate from confined adults, and may not at any time be kept in the same cell, room or yard with confined adults. To accept or hold youth, county jails must comply with all monitoring standards for juvenile detention homes promulgated by the Department of Corrections and training approved by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Standards Board. Prior to the Juvenile Court Act change on January 1, 1999, minors could only be kept up to 36 hours in jail. In addition, youth who are held in detention and turn 17 while in detention may be released to and held in a jail facility regardless of these standards. A youth can only be held in an adult jail during their adjudicatory hearing.
Adult Lockup	Similar to an adult jail except that an adult lockup is generally a municipal or police facility of a temporary nature that does not hold persons after they have been formally charged.
Arrest	The taking of a youth into custody by a law enforcement officer (1) who has probable cause to believe the minor is delinquent; or (2) that the minor is a ward of the court who has escaped from a court-ordered commitment; or (3) whom the officer reasonably believes has violated the conditions of probation or supervision ordered by the court.
Arrest	The taking of a youth into custody by a law enforcement officer (1) who has probable cause to believe the minor is delinquent; or (2) that the minor is a ward of the court who has escaped from a court-ordered commitment; or (3) whom the officer reasonably believes has violated the conditions of probation or supervision ordered by the court.

Automatic transfer (Excluded Jurisdiction)	The criminal court is established as the original court of jurisdiction if the youth is over 15 years old and accused of committing an offense listed below: first degree murder, aggravated criminal sexual assault, aggravated battery with a firearm, armed robbery with a firearm, or aggravated vehicular hijacking with a firearm. Also establishes the criminal court as the original court of jurisdiction for offenses that occurred in connection with the aforementioned offenses.
Balanced and restorative justice (BARJ)	A justice philosophy that an offender be held accountable for his or her actions to victims and the community, that increases offender competencies, and that protects the public through processes in which victims, the community, and offenders are all active participants. BARJ principles were included in the Juvenile Court Act effective January 1, 1999.
Calendar Year	Time period used for monitoring and reporting (January 1 to December 31 in a single year).

Cell	An area that has three walls & a grilled front door or a security glass front and door that is used to detain or confine adults or to detain juveniles 16 years of age or older.
Chronic (habitual) truant	A minor subject to compulsory school attendance who is absent without valid cause from such attendance for 10 percent or more of the previous 180 regular attendance days (more than 18 unexcused absences).
Civil-type offender	A juvenile or offender who has been charged with or adjudicated for an offense that is civil in nature. Examples include noncriminal traffic violations and noncriminal game violations
Clear and convincing evidence	The degree of proof which, considering all evidence in the case, produces the firm belief that it is highly probable that the facts sought to be proved are true.
Collar counties	The five counties that surround Cook County: Du Page County, Kane County, Lake County, McHenry County, and Will County.
Collocated Facility	A collocated facility is a juvenile facility that is located in the same building as an adult Jail or lockup or is a part of a related complex of buildings located on the same grounds as an adult jail or lockup. A complex of buildings is considered "related" when it shares physical features such as walls and fences or services beyond mechanical services(heating, air conditioning, water and sewer) 28CFR 31.303(D).
Community service	Uncompensated labor as a court requirement for alleged or adjudicated offenders for a non-profit organization or public body, which agrees to accept public or community service from offenders and to report on the progress of the offenders and community service to the court.
Concurrent Jurisdiction	Any minor alleged to have violated a traffic, boating, or fish and game law, or a municipal or county ordinance, may be prosecuted for the violation and if found guilty punished under any statute or ordinance relating to the violation.
Contact	Any physical or sustained sight and sound contact between juvenile offenders in a secure custody status and incarcerated adults, including inmate trustees. Sight contact is defined as clear visual contact between incarcerated adults and juveniles within close proximity to each other. Sound contact is defined as a direct oral communication between incarcerated adults and juvenile offenders.
Continuance under court supervision	When the court enters an order (1) upon an admission or stipulation by the appropriate respondent or minor respondent of the facts supporting the petition and before proceeding to adjudication, or after hearing the evidence at the adjudicatory hearing, and (2) in the absence of objection made in open court by the minor, his or her guardian, defense attorney, or state's attorney. During the continuance period, not to exceed 24 months, the court requires the minor to follow specific conditions (found at 705 ILCS 405/5-615(5)) ordered by the court and the minor is supervised by court services. If the alleged offender successfully completes the conditions imposed by the court, the petition is dismissed. A court can enter a continuance under supervision for any offense other than first degree murder, a Class X felony or a forcible felony.
Correctional institution Or facility	Any building or part of a building where committed persons are kept in a secure manner.

Court	A circuit court in a session or division assigned to hear proceedings under the Illinois Act (705 ILCS 405/5-105) and includes the term Juvenile Court.
Court holding facility	A court holding facility is a secure facility, other than an adult jail or lockup that is used to temporarily detain persons immediately before or after detention hearings or other court proceedings.
Court commitment	A sentence to IDOC after adjudication of delinquency by the courts or for a court evaluation.
Court evaluation	A short-term, court-ordered, 30, 60, or 90-day commitment to the Department of Corrections, Juvenile Division to assess the needs of a delinquent youth through a comprehensive diagnosis and assessment for the purpose of identifying needs providing the court with information to make placement decisions.
Court evaluation return	A return of a youth to serve an indeterminate term in IDJJ decided by a juvenile court judge based on the court evaluation.
Court services (or probation departments)	Provided by probation services in each county. The chief judge of each circuit makes provision for probation services through the appointment of officers to a probation or court services department. The Probation and Probation Officers Act governs the administration of these departments.
Criminal-type offender	A juvenile offender who has been charged with or adjudicated for conduct that would, under the law of the jurisdiction in which the offense was committed, be a crime if committed by an adult. (28 CFR 31.304(G))
Delayed egress device	A device that precludes the use of exits for a predetermined period of time.
Deinstitutionalization of Status Offenders (DSO)	No minor accused of a status offense (an act that would not be criminal if committed by an adult) may be securely detained in a jail, lockup or juvenile detention center. Examples of status offenses are truancy, running away, curfew violations, underage drinking and being ungovernable (MRAI). An exception is granted for status offenders detained for violation of a court order. This requirement also extends to non-offenders, juveniles who are subject to the jurisdiction of the juvenile court, usually under abuse, dependency, or neglect statutes, for reasons other than legally prohibited conduct of the juvenile)
Deinstitutionalization of Status Offenders OJJDP provisions	Section 223(a)(12)(A) of the OJJDP Act provides that status offenders and non-offenders not be detained or confined in secure detention or correctional facilities. OJJDP policy has since 1975, provided an exception to allow a status offender to be detained for up to 24 hours, exclusive of week ends and legal holidays, in a juvenile detention center facility. The revised core requirement expressly provides that it is permissible to hold an accused status offender in a secure juvenile detention center facility for up to 24 hours, exclusive of weekends and legal holidays, prior to an initial court appearance and for an additional 24 hours exclusive of weekends and legal holidays, immediately following an initial court appearance. Non - offenders can not be held in a juvenile detention center for any length of time.
Delinquency commitments	A delinquent age 13 or over may be committed to the Juvenile Division of the Illinois Department of Corrections when the court finds that (1) the minor's guardian is unfit or unable, other than for financial reasons, to care for, protect, and discipline the minor, or is unwilling to do so, and that the best interests of the public would not be served by another form of placement, or (2) it is necessary to ensure the protection of the public from the consequences of criminal activity of the delinquent. Offenders transferred to the adult courts and committed to the Illinois Department of Corrections are the responsibility of the Juvenile Division at least until age 17, but never beyond age 21.
Delinquency petitions	Documents filed in delinquency cases with the juvenile court through the state's attorney alleging that a juvenile is a delinquent. The petition sets forth the supporting facts regarding the alleged offense, information about the minor, and, if the minor is detained, the start dates of the detention. The petition requests that the minor be adjudged a ward of the court and asks for relief under the Juvenile Court Act. Supplemental petitions may be filed alleging new offenses or alleging new violations of orders entered by the court in the delinquency proceeding.
Delinquent Minor	Minors who, prior to their 17th birthday, have violated or attempted to violate any federal or state law, or municipal ordinance. Violation of a county ordinance was added on January 1, 1999.



Departments	Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC) Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) Illinois Department of Juvenile Justice (IDJJ) Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts (AOIC)
Detention	The temporary care of a minor alleged or adjudicated as delinquent who requires secure custody for his or her own or the community's protection in a facility designed to physically restrict his or her movements, pending disposition by the court or execution of an order of the court for placement or commitment. According to the Juvenile Court Act, minors are placed in detention if there is a matter of immediate and urgent necessity for the protection of the minor or the community, there is concern the minor is likely to flee the jurisdiction of the court, or that the minor was taken into custody under a warrant.
Detention hearing	Hearing to determine whether there is probable cause to believe that a minor age 10 or older is delinquent and whether there is immediate need for the minor to be detained until trial. The hearing must be held within 40 hours of taking the minor into custody, exclusive of weekends and holidays, or the minor must be released.
Detention Room	An area that has four walls and a door (no bars or grilled front) that is used to detain juveniles or adults.
Detention screening instrument	An objective, scorable instrument administered by a detention screener to determine if the youth's current offense and prior history are severe enough to warrant detaining the youth until his or her detention hearing.
Determinate sentence	A sentence in which the length of time of a sentence to a correctional facility is statutorily defined [730 ILCS 5/5-8-1]. Illinois adopted a determinate sentencing model on February 1, 1978.
Detoxification	The process of withdrawing a person from a specific psychoactive substance in a safe and effective manner.
Discharge	The final termination of a commitment to IDOC, IDJJ and probation placement.
Discretionary transfer	A transfer of a minor 13 years of age or older to adult court for criminal prosecution when a motion has been filed by the state's attorney and the judge finds that there is probable cause to believe the allegations in the motion to be true and it is not in the best interest of the public to proceed under the Juvenile Court Act.
Dispositional hearing (disposition)	Hearing to determine whether a minor should be adjudged to be a ward of the court and to determine what order of disposition should be made. Effective January 1, 1999, the term "sentencing hearing" replaced "dispositional hearing" in delinquency cases.
Disproportionate minority confinement (DMC)	The over-representation of minority youth in secure juvenile facilities compared to minority youth representation in the general population.
Disproportionate minority contact (DMC)	The over-representation of minority youth involved in the juvenile justice system at any given stage of the process compared to minority youth representation in the general population.
Disproportionate Representation index (DRI)	Compares the percentage of all youth who are of a particular minority group at one stage of the juvenile justice process to that minority group's representation at the previous stage.
Diversion	The referral of a juvenile without court intervention into a program that provides services designed to educate the juvenile and develop a productive and responsible approach to living in the community.
Drug offenses	Violations of the following public acts regarding illegal drugs and liquor violations by minors: Cannabis Control Act, Controlled Substances Act, Hypodermic Syringes and Needles Act, Drug Paraphernalia Act, and Liquor Control Act.
Exclusive jurisdiction	Exclusion from the jurisdiction of the juvenile court by age or crime committed.
Extended jurisdiction juvenile prosecution	A juvenile prosecution where a juvenile, if found delinquent, receives a juvenile and an adult sentence with the adult sentence stayed pending satisfactory completion of the juvenile sentence. Should the juvenile not satisfactorily complete the juvenile sentence, the adult sentence will be imposed. See 705 ILCS 405/5-810(4).

Facility	A place, an institution, a building or part thereof, set of buildings, or an area whether or not enclosing a building or a set of buildings which is used for the lawful custody and treatment of juveniles and may be allowed and /or operated by public and private agencies.
Forcible felony	Violations of criminal law that include: treason, first degree murder, second degree murder, predatory criminal sexual assault of a child, aggravated arson, arson, aggravated kidnapping, kidnapping, aggravated battery resulting in great bodily harm, or other felony which involved the use or threat of physical force or violence. See 720 ILCS 5/2-8.
Formal probation	The guidance, treatment, or regulation by a probation officer for the behavior of delinquent youth, after a court sentence. Youth adjudicated delinquent can be sentenced to probation for a maximum of five years or until age 21, whichever comes first.
Deinstitutionalization of Status Offenders (DSO)	Deinstitutionalization of Status Offenders (DSO)
Group home	24-hour supervision by professionally trained staff for as many as 12 youth. Youth may attend community schools, but usually education is provided on the premises due to security risks. Professional parenting group homes provide a highly structured home environment. Youth served are individuals who are waiting for further action by the court and who would otherwise be placed in a secure detention setting as a result of having no other option available. Professional parents serve no more than four youth at a time.
Home detention	An alternative to the intensity and expense of secure detention, in which a minor is ordered to remain home, with possible exceptions for school attendance or similar necessary exceptions, and a probation officer monitors the youth's confinement to home. Home detention may be pre- or post-dispositional and may include electronic monitoring. Intensive supervision detention is a higher level of intervention than home detention. Greater restrictiveness is provided by more frequent supervision, visits, or contacts.
Illinois Juvenile Justice Commission (IJJC)	The Illinois Juvenile Justice Commission (IJJC) is the State Advisory Group for Illinois. This Commission has 25 members= positions appointed by the Governor. They have training, experience, or special knowledge concerning the prevention and treatment of juvenile delinquency or the administration of justice. Members serve three-year terms and must be reappointed or re[placed].
Incarceration of minors	Except for minors accused of violation of an order of the court, any minor accused of any act under federal or state law, or a municipal ordinance that would be illegal if committed by an adult, cannot be placed in a jail, municipal lockup, detention center or secure correctional facility. Confinement in a county jail of a minor accused of a violation of an order of the court, or of a minor of r whom there is reasonable cause to believe that the minor is a person described in subsection (3) of section 5-105, shall be in accordance with the restrictions set forth in sections 5-410 and 5-501 of the Juvenile Court Act.
Indeterminate sentence	A sentence in which the length of time of a sentence to a correctional facility is given in a minimum and maximum time period. The release of the individual on parole is discretionarily determined by a correctional authority, typically a Parole Review Board or a Prisoner Review Board. In Illinois, only juveniles receive indeterminate sentences.
Informal probation	The guidance, treatment, or regulation by a probation officer for the behavior of non-delinquent youth prior to a court referral. Informal probation provides short-term care and functions as a diversion option from the formal court process.
Intake screening of delinquency	Used when a juvenile is referred to the court, or to the place designated by the court. At an intake screening, a probation officer or another officer designated by the court investigates the circumstances of the minor and the facts surrounding his or her being taken into custody for the purpose of determining whether a delinquency petition should be filed.
Intensive probation	A more intrusive form of probation, including increased daily contact with youth, usually at least 2-3 daily contacts. Specially trained probation officers know each youth's schedule of activities and whereabouts at all times. Youth are required to "check in" personally or by phone and to review their schedule of the day's activities. Intensive probation officers often work directly with the families.
Jail or lockups	A secure facility operated by a municipal police department or county sheriff for the temporary detention of persons who are being held for investigation pending disposition

	of their cases by the judiciary or who are awaiting transfer to another institution.
Juvenile Detention Center (Home)	A public facility with specially trained staff that conforms to the county juvenile detention standards promulgated by IDJJ.
Jail and Detention Standards Unit	Unit within the Division of Support Services of the Department of Corrections which is authorized to monitor compliance with Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards. Monitors jails and lockups for Feral Juvenile core requirements under a grant from IJJC.
Jail Removal Core Requirement	The Illinois Juvenile Court Act was rewritten becoming effective in 1999. One new provision is in direct conflict with the Jail Removal requirement of the JJDP Act. The new provision permits county jails and municipal lockups to detain minors 12 years of age and older up to 12 hours, unless the offense is a crime of violence, in which case the minor may be detained up to 24 hours. Even with this conflict Illinois has been in compliance since 1999. The State of Illinois certifies as in this case where the state and federal definitions differ that the federal definition is and will be used in the monitoring process.
Judicial circuit	Illinois is divided into 23 judicial circuits, Cook County being designated as one circuit, and the remaining circuits designated by number. Most judicial circuits consist of several counties with one shared circuit court. Court services may be provided for an entire judicial circuit, and not for each individual county in the circuit.
Juvenile	Youth in juvenile justice system are under the age of 17 in Illinois. However, in general the term refers to individuals under age 18, which is a reporting category for youth defined by the U.S. Census Bureau. Demographic data from federal sources typically categorize juveniles as under age 18. See "delinquent minor" and "minor."
Juvenile offender	An individual subject to the exercise of juvenile court jurisdiction for purposes of an adjudication and treatment based on age and offense limitations as –type offender or status offender. defined by state law, i.e., a criminal
Juvenile investigation report	A court-ordered investigation completed by probation departments to highlight a youth's background and prior delinquent history in order to determine if filing a case against the youth is appropriate. See 705 ILCS 405/5-701.
Juvenile who is accused of having committed an offense	A juvenile with respect to whom a petition has been file in the juvenile court or other action has occurred alleging that such juvenile is a juvenile offender, i.e., a criminal-type offender or status offender, and no final adjudication has been made by the juvenile court.
Juvenile who has been adjudicated as having committed an offense.	A juvenile with respect to whom the juvenile court has determined that such juvenile is a juvenile offender, i.e., a criminal –type offender or a status offender.
Juvenile Monitoring Information System (eJMIS)	A juvenile detention data collection program that complies information regarding youth in Detention. It is funded by the Illinois Juvenile Justice Commission and is overseen by the Center for Prevention Research and Development at the University of Illinois Champaign-Urbana to input data and pull records.
Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act (OJJDP)	The federal OJJDP Act of 1974 established a block grant program to the States by formula based upon juvenile population. The Illinois Juvenile Justice Commission oversees the program. In order to be eligible to receive grant funds, states must be committed to achieving and maintaining compliance with the core requirements of the JJDP Act. The four core requirements are: (1) remove non-offending youth and status offenders from locked facilities (deinstitutionalization of status offenders, or DSO); (2) ensure complete separation of youth from adult offenders in county jails and municipal lockups (jail separation); (3) eliminate confinement of juveniles in county jails and municipal lockups (jail removal); and (4) assess the representation of minority youth in the juvenile justice system, and where disparity exists, develop strategies to address the disparity-disproportionate minority confinement.
Juvenile police officer	A sworn police officer who has completed a Basic Recruit Training Course, has been assigned to the position of juvenile police officer by his or her chief law enforcement officer and has completed the necessary juvenile officers training as prescribed by the Illinois Law Enforcement Training Board or in the case of a State police officer, juvenile officer training approved by the Director of the State Police.
Lawful custody.	The exercise of care, supervision, and control over a juvenile offender or non offender pursuant to the provisions of the law or of a judicial order or decree.

Mandatory supervised release (MSR)	Once the sentence of incarceration has been completed, inmates are statutorily mandated to be released under the supervision of the correctional authority for a period of time that is statutorily defined [730 ILCS 5/3-3-7]. On February 1, 1978, Illinois adopted a determinate sentencing model, which statutorily defines prison sentences and time spent under supervision of a parole agent.
Mandatory transfer	A motion filed by the State's Attorney to allow the prosecution of a youth 15 years of age or older for a forcible felony if the youth has previously been adjudicated delinquent for an offense that was committed in furtherance of criminal activity of a gang, and the juvenile judge determines there is probable cause that the allegations are true.
Minor	A person under the age of 21 years old.
Minors requiring authoritative intervention (MRAI)	A subcategory of "offense" status that refers to minors less than 18 years who are absent from home without consent of a guardian, or are beyond control of a guardian in circumstances which constitute a substantial or immediate danger to the minor's physical safety. Additionally, the minor has to have been in limited custody for a statutory period of time. See 705 ILCS 405/3-3.
Neglected child	Any child who is not receiving the care, support, or education required by law.
Non-offenders	Juveniles who are subject to the jurisdiction of the juvenile court, usually under abuse, dependency, or neglect statutes, for reasons other than legally prohibited conduct of the juvenile.
Non-secure custody or non-secure detention	For a minor that requires care away from his or her home but does not require physical restriction. Temporary custody shall be given to a foster family, or shelter facility designated by the court. Also a juvenile may be in law enforcement custody and therefore not free to leave or depart from the presence of a law enforcement officer or at liberty to leave the premises of a law enforcement facility, but not be in a secure detention or confinement status.
Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)	A component of the <a href="#">Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice</a> , accomplishes its <a href="#">mission</a> by supporting states, local communities, and tribal jurisdictions in their efforts to develop and implement effective programs for juveniles.
Other individual accused of having committed a criminal offense	An individual, adult or juvenile, who has been charged with committing a criminal offense in a court exercising criminal jurisdiction.
Other individual convicted of a criminal offense.	An individual, adult or juvenile who has been convicted of a criminal offense by the court exercising criminal jurisdiction.
Outpatient	Services that consist of face-to-face clinical services for adolescents in a non- residential setting with regularly scheduled sessions that typically average less than nine hours per week.
Parole	Discretionary early release of an inmate sentenced to a correctional facility with an indeterminate sentence before serving the maximum time of their sentence under the supervision of a parole officer. Early release is at the discretion of parole authorities, most commonly a Parole Review Board or a Prisoner Review Board. Both mandatory supervised release (MSR) and parole are commonly referred to as parole.
Placement	Court-ordered commitments or assignments to non-secure settings such as placements with relatives, foster homes, group homes, or residential treatment.
Post-trial detention	The detainment of youth adjudicated delinquent following their trial.
Pre-trial detention	The detainment of youth accused of delinquent acts but who have not yet had a trial.
Presumptive transfer	A transfer to adult court for criminal prosecution if there is probable cause that a juvenile has committed a Class X felony or certain other offenses, and the juvenile court judge is unable to make a finding based on clear and convincing evidence that the juvenile is amendable to the care, treatment, and training programs available to the juvenile court.

Probable cause	A reasonable belief that a fact is more probably true than not.
Probation	The conditional freedom granted by a judicial officer to an alleged or adjudicated delinquent offender, as long as the person meets certain conditions. The period of probation may not exceed five years or extend beyond the offender's 21st birthday, whichever is less. A probation violation occurs when one or more of the conditions of probation are not followed and may result in a commitment to the Department of Corrections. The age limit for probation was changed to 21 years old on January 1, 1999 with the Juvenile Court Act change.
Property crime index	A subcategory of non-violent index crime referring to serious crimes against property, including burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson.
Relative rate index (RRI)	A measure of disproportionate minority contact. Compares the rate at which one racial or ethnic group is represented at a particular juvenile justice decision point to the rate a different racial or ethnic group is represented at the same decision point.
Representation index (RI)	Compares the percentage of all youth of a particular minority group at a certain juvenile justice decision point to that minority group's representation in the general juvenile population.
Return additional mittimus	An offender, upon completing a sentence, is ordered to serve time on a prior offense sentence.
Residential treatment	Substance abuse treatment that consists of clinical services for adolescents. A planned regimen of clinical services for a minimum of 25 hours per week must be included and requires staff on duty 24 hours per day, seven days per week. These treatment programs may address special juvenile offender populations such as sex offenders, teen prostitutes, and substance abusers.
Restitution	A court requirement that an alleged or adjudicated offender pays money or provides services to the victim of the crime or provide services to the community.
Revocation of probation or parole	A legal process in which the probation or parole order of an individual is revoked and that individual must either return to court or return to a correctional facility to serve the remainder of their parole period [730 ILCS 5/3-3-9].
Secure custody and detention	Confinement where the minor is physically restricted by being placed in a locked cell, room or facility, or by other means, such as being handcuffed to a stationary object, or by other means such as detention or correctional facilities, this term also includes residential facilities that include construction features designed to physically restrict the movements and activities of persons in custody buildings, fences, or other physical structures. It does not include facilities where physical restriction of movement or activity is provided solely through facility staff.
Sentencing hearing	See dispositional hearing.
Shelter care (temporary custody)	Any minor taken into temporary custody pursuant to this act who requires care away from his or her home but who does not require physical restriction shall be given temporary care in a foster family home or other shelter facility designated by the court .
Sight and Sound Separation	This Core Requirement mandates the sight and separation of adult and juvenile offenders whenever they are held in the same facility.
Staff secure facility.	A staff secure facility may be defined as a residential facility(1) which does not include construction features designed to physically restrict the movements and activities of juveniles who are in custody therein; (2) which may establish reasonable rules restricting entrance to and egress from the facility; and (3) in which the movements and activities of individual residents may, for treatment purposes, be restricted or subject to control through the use of intensive staff supervision.



State Advisory Group (SAG)	See Illinois Juvenile Justice Commission.
State Fiscal Year	In Illinois, runs from July 1 through June 30.
Station adjustment	The informal or formal handling of a minor by a juvenile police officer as a diversionary intervention procedure as defined by the Illinois Juvenile Court Act (705 ILCS 405/5-301).
Status offender	Any offense committed by a juvenile that would not be a crime if committed by an adult; an offense specifically applicable to juveniles because of their age (e.g. non-criminal behavior such as curfew violations, running away from home, truancy, consumption of tobacco products and underage possession and/or consumption of alcohol. This offense is always considered a status offense, even though State or local law may consider it a delinquent offense.
Supervision (or supervised probation)	The guidance, treatment, or regulation of a youth by a probation agent on behalf of the court. Supervision may be imposed upon a youth adjudicated delinquent or upon certain non-delinquent youths such as Minors Requiring Authoritative Intervention (MRAI).
Supervision violation	The failure to abide by the terms of the juvenile's supervision agreement. A supervision agreement may be violated in two ways. (1) The agreement is violated if the juvenile commits a new offense. (2) Violating a specific term of the agreement is a technical supervision violation.
Supervision violation	The failure to abide by the terms of the juvenile's supervision agreement. A supervision agreement may be violated in two ways. (1) The agreement is violated if the juvenile commits a new offense. (2) Violating a specific term of the agreement is a technical supervision violation.
Technical violation (of parole or mandatory supervised release)	A violation of a specific condition or term of an individual's parole or mandatory supervised release. May result in a revocation of parole or mandatory supervised release and a return to a correctional facility [730 ILCS 5/3-3-9(a)].
Technical violation of probation	A violation of a specific condition or term off a youth's probation. May result in a revocation of probation and a sentence to secure custody.
Total detention days	Represents, for a given period in time, the total number of days all juveniles were held in secure detention for a particular jurisdiction.
Treatment Alternatives for Safe Communities, Inc. (TASC)	A private non-profit agency that provides substance abuse assessment and case management services to the courts.
Trial	See adjudicatory hearing.
Truant	A minor who is subject to compulsory school attendance from age 7-17 and is absent without valid cause.
Truant minor in need of supervision (TMINS)	A minor who is reported by a regional superintendent of schools, or in cities of over 500,000 inhabitants, by the Office of Chronic Truant Adjudication, as a chronic truant shall be adjudged a truant minor in need of supervision. [705 ILCS 405/3-33(a)]. It should be noted that this statute was repealed on July 7, 2006. The definition of TMINS is now found at 705 ILCS 405/3-33.5(a).
Unified delinquency intervention services program (UDIS)	Funded by the Department of Human Services, the program seeks to be a community alternative to a commitment to the Illinois Department of Corrections by providing intensive rehabilitative care. Services include advocacy, group work, and assisting youth in developing alternative behaviors. Performance goals include returning to school or acquiring gainful employment. The program was transferred from the Department of Children and Family Services on July 1, 1997.
Valid court order.	A valid court order is a court order given by a juvenile court judge to a juvenile who was

	brought before the court and made subject to the order, and who received, before the issuance of the order, the full due process rights guaranteed to such juvenile by the Constitution of the United States.
Victim offender conferencing	Victim offender conferencing programs are facilitated by a trained mediator and bring together the offender and victim. A discussion takes place and an agreement for the offender to follow is developed. These programs are also referred to as victim offender mediations, victim offender reconciliation programs, or community mediations.
Violent crime index	A subcategory of index crime referring to serious crimes against persons, including homicide, criminal sexual assault, armed robbery, aggravated assault, and aggravated battery.
Violent or person offenses	Crimes of physical violence, including homicide, criminal sexual assault, armed robbery, aggravated assault, aggravated battery, as well as simple battery and simple assault.
Warrant for arrest	A document issued by a judicial officer that directs law enforcement officers to arrest a person who has been accused of a specific offense. In juvenile cases, warrants may be issued for delinquent youth, MRAI, TINS, and dependent children.

## FORWARD

This manual contains the guidelines and procedures for conducting a juvenile monitor compliance inspection. The Illinois Department of Corrections urges the development of local practices may which divert many youth taken into secure custody, and being placed in an adult confinement situation. A temporary group, individual home assignment or detention facility are alternative means to secure custody.

It's recognized that a need exists for establishing juvenile detention homes, separate from the municipal and county jails, since a minimal percentage of youth require secure custody. Juvenile detention facilities are a part of the Justice system. Humane custodial care and treatment which protects civil and legal rights and recognizes their qualities as human beings is therefore required and anything less is counter productive to detention purposes.

Illinois Juvenile Court Act, Court decisions, and sound management principals provide fundamental guidance to establishing procedures and policies. Recommendations or procedures, which may be implemented toward improving the detention operations and every effort should be made to follow guidelines. The Illinois Department of Corrections shall establish for the operation of county, municipal jails, houses of correction, county juvenile detention and shelter care facilities establish pursuant to the county shelter care and detention home act. Minimum standards for the physical condition for each institution and for the treatment of inmates with respect to their health, safety, security of the community and to make recommendations to such institutions to insure compliance with the requirements of such minimum standards.

As outlined in the Illinois Compiled Statutes 405, Juvenile Court Act of 1987 formally Illinois Revised Statutes 1991, 2002 Edition. Chapter 37 Juvenile Court Act, as amended in accordance with P.A. 89-656 eff. 1-1-97; 90-590, eff. 1-1-99. police agencies should identify specific areas in their police facility for processing and holding of juveniles and clearly designate those areas for all officers. Juveniles must always be sight and sound conversation separate from adult offenders. This process may call for time phasing so no juvenile or adult offender come in contact with each other. There are secure and non- secure custody requirements that must be met.

### NONSECURE CUSTODY

1. Any area where the juvenile is held must be an unlocked multi-purpose area, such as a lobby, office, interrogation, or report writing room.
2. In no event can the area be designated or intended to be used for residential purposes.
3. The juvenile can not be physically secured to a cuffing rail or other stationary object.
4. The area or areas used are limited to providing non-secure custody only long enough for the purpose of identification, investigation, processing, or release to parents or arranging transfer to the juvenile facility or court.
5. The juvenile must be under continuous supervision until released.

A police agency may choose to have a "NO HOLD POLICY" for delinquent offenders. This means that even though the juvenile is charged with a delinquent offense the juvenile is always held in non-secure custody as they would be for a status offense.

It is necessary for those agencies who choose to use a "NO HOLD POLICY" to state that delinquents will be held in non secure custody and identifies specific areas within the facility where the juvenile might be placed and supervised. An example of this would be that "No juvenile would be placed in a cell, locked room or office or handcuffed to a stationary object. All juveniles interviewed or held in non-secure custody will be placed in the squad room under direct supervision by police personnel until released to parent or guardian, or transferred to a juvenile detention facility". You will discover while conducting an inspection for juvenile monitoring compliance that many aspects of the Illinois Juvenile Court Act follow through with the Illinois Department of Corrections Municipal, Jail, and Detention Standards. It is mandatory for monitors conducting this inspection for compliance to observe all necessary violations and make recommendations where needed.

DOC exempts facilities that have approved written policies or procedures that juveniles are not securely detained. Facility policies are checked by conducting on-site visits once every three years to assure that there have been no changes in such policies. DOC and IJC monitors are available to provide technical assistance in developing appropriate written policies and procedures. The IJC monitor and DOC, as part of the on-site inspection requirement, sample exempt facilities to ensure that these facilities are following the written procedures.

## **COMPLIANCE GUIDELINES, PROCEDURES AND REFERENCES FOR CONDUCTING JUVENILE MONITORING INSPECTIONS**

### **SECTION I**

#### **DATA INFORMATION**

- (a) The data requested by the juvenile monitoring report form consists of facility name, address, city, telephone, contact person, title of person and facility type.
- (b) Verifying facility address, telephone number and zip code.
- (c) Contact person should be Youth or Juvenile Division Commander, Shift Commander, Assistant Chief or Chief of Police. Always use the person in order of knowledge while conducting inspection.

### **SECTION II**

#### **CUSTODY ISSUES:**

- (a) **Question: Are youths held in custody for the purpose of identification, processing, until released to parents/guardians?**

Reference: Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention Policy Number 89-1201, Section: 223(a)(12)(A)

State law and Federal Requirements are the same.

It is OJJDP's policy not to hold status offenders or non-offenders in juvenile detention or correctional facilities. There may be situations where short-term secure custody of accused status offenders and non-offenders is necessary. This detention should be for a brief period of time prior to formal juvenile court action. For investigative purposes and for identification purposes to allow return to juvenile's parents or guardian or detention for a brief period of time under juvenile court authority in order to arrange for appropriate shelter care placement and may be necessary. Further reference should be noted in the Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition, Section 705ILCS 405/5-405 Duty of Officer; Admissions by Minor. Section 5-405 (4) (a thru h) "Factors to be considered in determining whether to release or keep the minor in custody shall include the following: The nature of allegations against the minor, the minor's history and present situation, the history of minor's family and the family's present situation, education and employment status of the minor, and the availability of special resources of community services to aid or counsel the minor, the minor's past involvement with the progress in social programs, the attitude of complainant towards the minor and the present attitude of the minor and family.

- (b) **Question: Are youths who are held in custody placed in an area that is sight and sound separate from the general public as well as adult offenders?**

Reference: Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention Policy Number 89-1301, Section 223(a)(13)

State law and Federal Requirements are the same.

The OJJDP discourages the placement of any youth in the facility for the detention or confinement of adult criminal offenders. Minimal and acceptable separation for monitoring purposes of Section 223(a)(13) means that juvenile offenders and adult criminal offenders can not see each other and no conversation is possible.

To further this reference, reference should be made to the Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition 705ILCS 405/5-410(2c)(ii)(v) and (2f,g). Any juvenile under 17 years of age shall be kept separate from confined adults in municipal lockups or county jails and may not at any time be kept in the same cell, room or yard with adults confined pursuant to criminal law. In such a manner that there will be no contact by sight, sound or otherwise between the juvenile and adult prisoners.

**(c) Question: Are status offenders being securely detained?**

Reference: Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition, Section: 705ILCS 405/3-1: 405/3-3 and Section: 705ILCS 405/5-401 (3) Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 edition.

Except for minors accused of violation of an order of the court,' any minor accused of any act under federal or State law or municipal ordinance which would not be illegal by an adult can not be placed in a jail. This also applies to municipal lockups, detention centers, or other secure correctional facilities. Juveniles accused with under age consumption and under age possession of alcohol can not be placed in a jail or municipal lockup detention center or correctional facility.

### **Section III**

#### **POLICY OR GENERAL WRITTEN ORDERS**

**(a) Question: Does this facility have a current written policy reflecting the handling of juveniles who are status offenders?**

Reference: Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition 705ILCS 405/1-2 Purpose and Policy

Reference: Illinois County Jail Standards Section 701.10 b) and Illinois Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards Section 720.25 b)

It is important for police agencies to establish guidelines and procedures for the handling of juvenile case file matters. As stated in Chapter 705ILCS 405, Juvenile Court Act of 1987, formerly (Illinois Revised Statutes 1991 Chapter 37-Juvenile Court Act); as outlined in 705ILCS 405/1-2. When a juvenile is placed in custody it's necessary to provide care and guidance as well as to serve the moral, emotional, mental, and physical welfare of the minor as well as the best interest of the community. The Illinois Juvenile Justice Committee and the Illinois Local Governmental Law Enforcement officer's Training Board has provided a model policy, and encourages all police agencies to view the model policy when available, especially those agencies that may not have a written policy. The written policies should reflect as well as identify the handling and custody of juveniles. The policy should reflect and identify specific areas of police facilities for processing and holding of juveniles and clearly designate those areas for all officers. Agencies within their policy should also reflect whether or not their agency is a "NO HOLD" agency.

If secure custody is an issue, their policy should reflect secure care issues, which should also indicate the specific areas of detention.

**(b) Question: Where are status offenders held?**

Reference: Illinois County Jail Standards Section 701.270(a)(2) and Illinois Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards Section 720.150

Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition Section 705ILCS 405/1-4.1,

As stated in the Illinois Department of Corrections Standards, "No minor under 16 years of age may be confined in a jail or place ordinarily used for the confinement of prisoners in a police station.

Minors under 17 years of age must be kept separate from confined adults and may not at any time be kept in the same cell, room, or yard with adults confined pursuant to the Criminal Law".

As outlined in the Illinois Juvenile Court Act, 705ILCS 405/1-4.1. Except for minors accused of violation of an order of the court, any minor accused of any act under federal or State Law, or a municipal ordinance that would not be illegal if committed by an adult, cannot be placed in a jail, municipal lockup, detention center or secure correctional facility. This statement is also reflected in Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards 720.150.

There are many issues concerning secure and non-secure custody of minors. It is important to understand that status offenders may not be securely detained under any circumstances.

Illinois law is the same as federal requirements

Issues concerning non-secure custody requires the following five standards to be met:

1. Any area where the juvenile is held must be an unlocked multi-purpose area, such as a lobby, office, interrogation or report writing room.
2. In no event can the area be designed, or intended to be used for residential purposes.
3. The juvenile must not be secured to a cuffing rail or other stationary object.
4. The use of the area(s) is limited to providing non-secure custody only long enough for the purposes of identification, investigation, processing, release to parents or arranging transfer to an appropriate agency (juvenile facility or court).
5. The juvenile must be under continuous supervision until release.

It should be noted, that during inspection that the area that the juvenile status offender is held is a non secure sight and sound separate area. This area, should be designated for all officers of the department to utilize for interview.

- (c) **Question: Does your agency make a reasonable attempt to notify the parent or other person legally responsible for the minor's care or the person with whom the minor resides that the minor has been taken into custody and where he or she is being held?**

Reference: Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition t, Section 705ILCS 405/2-6

Duty of officer: (1) A law enforcement officer who takes a minor into custody under section 2-5 shall immediately make a reasonable attempt to notify the parent or other person legally responsible for the minor's care or the person with whom the minor resides. That the minor has been taken into custody, and where he or she is being held.

As related in 705ILCS 405/2-8. The minor shall be immediately released to the custody of his/her parent, guardian, legal custodian, and or responsible relative, unless the probation officer or such other public officer designated by the court finds that further temporary protective custody is necessary, as provided by 705ILCS 405/2-7).

- (d) **Question: Are youths charged with underage drinking and possession of alcohol being securely detained?**

Reference: Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Editon, Section 705ILCS 405/1-4.1.

As stated in paragraph 4, except for minors accused of violation of an order of the court, any minor accused of an act under federal or State Law, or a Municipal ordinance that would not be illegal if committed by an adult, cannot be



placed in a jail, municipal lockup, detention center, or secure correctional facility. Possession of alcohol is a status offense.

- (e) **Question: Are youths who are severely under the influence of alcohol and /or drugs examined by EMS/BLS and/or transported to the nearest hospital for treatment?**

Reference: Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition; Section 705ILCS 405/4-4(1) (a)(c)

As stated. A minor whom the officer with reasonable cause believes to be an addicted minor, or a minor who is found in any street or public place suffering from any sickness or injury which requires care, medical treatment or hospitalization a law enforcement officer may, without a warrant, take into temporary custody.

- (f) **Question: Does this facility securely detain juveniles?**

Reference: Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition; Section 705ILCS 405/5-410(2)(a)(b)(c)(d)(e).

Reference: Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention Policy Number 89-1201, Section: 223(a) (14)

State law differs with Federal Requirements.

Federal Requirements allows alleged delinquents to be detained for up to six hours for the purpose of investigation and identification. The clock starts the moment a juvenile is placed into a locked setting. This includes any locked room, or when a juvenile is cuffed to a stationary object. At the end of six hours, the juvenile must be released or transferred to a juvenile detention center. Starting in the year 2000 we began using a new interpretation of the six hour rule approved by OJJDP stating that once the clock starts, it can be stopped once the juvenile is permanently removed from the secure setting.

Section 705ILCS 405/410. Changes the “six hour rule” to provide that no minor under 12 years of age may be placed in a secure custody,(Confinement in a county jail or municipal lockup) for more than six hours, but a minor 12 years of age or older may be subject to secure custody for up to twelve hours, unless the offense is a “crime of violence,” then he or she is subject to secure custody for up to twenty four hours. The written authorization of the probation officer constitutes authority for the superintendent of any juvenile detention home to detain and keep a minor up to 40 hours, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and court-designated holidays. The period of detention is deemed to have begun once the minor has been placed in a locked room or cell or handcuffed to a stationary object..

Any minor so confined shall be under periodic supervision and should not be permitted to come into or remain in contact with adults in custody in the building. Upon placement in secure custody in a jail or lockup, the minor shall be informed of the purpose of the detention, the time it is expected to last and the fact that it can exceed six hours.

**Monitoring staff should encouraged secure holding facilities not to exceed 6 hours.**

## **SECTION IV**

### **RECORDS**

- (a) **Question: Has an inspection of the juvenile detention log been completed?**

Reference: Illinois Department of Corrections County Jail Standards; Section 701.40 k) and Illinois Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards Section 720.120 a) b0

Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition; Section 705ILCS 405/5-410©(1v)

States that a record or records for each detainee shall be established at the admission and maintained through out the period of confinement. As stated in Illinois Municipal Jail and Lock-Up Standards, 720.130, the Chief of Police or other responsible supervisor designated by him, shall furnish monthly reports to the Jail and Detention Standards Unit utilizing appropriate forms supplied by the Illinois Department of Corrections. This report will include the total

number of Juveniles male and female detained during the month. The report shall include pertinent information, shall be submitted by the tenth day following each month and shall include only those persons securely detained.

**Monitors should check monthly reports against admission records to determine accuracy of reports.**

- (b) **Question: Does the facility have a current written policy reflecting the handling of juveniles who are delinquent offenders.**

Reference: Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition, 705ILCS 405/1-2 Purpose and Policy

Reference: Illinois County Jail Standards Section 701.10 b) and Illinois Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards Section 720.25 b)

It is important for police agencies to establish guidelines and procedures for the handling of juvenile case file matters, as stated in Chapter 705ILCS 405, Juvenile Court Act of 1987, formerly (Illinois Revised Statutes 1991 Chapter 37-Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition). As outlined in 705ILCS 405/1-2, when a juvenile is placed in custody it should be necessary to provide care and guidance as well as to serve the moral, emotional, mental, and physical welfare of the minor and the best interest of the community. The Illinois Juvenile Justice Committee and the Illinois Local Governmental Law Enforcement officer's Training Board has provided a model policy, and encourages all police agencies to view the model policy when available, especially those agencies that may not have a written policy. The written policies should reflect as well as identify the handling and custody of juveniles. The policy should reflect and identify specific areas of police facilities for processing and holding of juveniles and clearly designate those areas for all officers. Agencies, thru their policy should also reflect whether or not their agency is a "NO HOLD" agency.

- (c) **Question: Are juveniles who are securely detained:**
- A. Detained sight separate from adult offenders?**
  - B. Detained sound separate from adult offenders?**

Reference: Illinois County Jail Standards Section 701.270 and Illinois Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards Section 720.150

Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition Section 405/5-410

As stated in the referenced standards and statute minors under 17 may be detained temporarily in a room not cell in a county jail where the place of confinement is a separate floor or section which insures complete and effective isolation from any contact with adult prisoners. Furthermore, minors under 17 may be confined in cells or rooms in a jail a place ordinarily used for confinement of prisoners at a county jail, but these cells or rooms for the minors must be separate and distinct from the cells or rooms which adults are confined. It must be noted that separate and distinct means no visual or auditory contact.

- (d) **Question: Are securely detained male and female juveniles housed?**
- A. Sight separate from one another?**
  - B. Sound separate from one another?**

Reference: Illinois Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards Section 720.50 a)1) and Illinois County Jail Standards Section 701.70b)1).

As stated, in the Illinois Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards, male and female detainees shall be completely segregated. Quarters for males and females shall be located so that physical, visual and auditory contact between the sexes is prevented.

- (e) **Question: Are juvenile offenders under 16 years of age who are being securely detained, housed in a:**

- A. Room
- B. Cell

Reference: Illinois County Jail Standards Section 701.270 Illinois Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards Section 720.150

Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition Section 405/5-410

Minors under 17 may be detained temporarily in a room, not a cell, in a county jail or the place of confinement is a separate floor or section, which insures a complete and effective isolation from any contact with any adult prisoners.

- (f) **Question: Do only female employees provide supervision of female detainees at appropriate times?**
- A. Physical contact or body searches
  - B. Showers, baths, toileting and related activities.

Reference: Illinois Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards Section 720.150 b)6)A)B), Illinois County Jail Standards Section 701.270 b)6)A)B)

Detainees shall under the following conditions, be provided with supervision by a person of the same sex, When following established procedures which require physical contact or examination such as body searches, during periods of personal hygiene activities and care such as showers, toileting and related activities. Subsection (b)(6) does not prohibit the use of necessary force by a staff member of a sex other than that of a detainee.

- (g) **Question: Are securely detained youths being monitored every 15 minutes?**

Reference: County Jail Standards Section 701.270 b)8) Illinois Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards Section 720.150b)8).

A periodic visual check of juveniles confined shall be made by personal observation, not including observation by a monitoring device. Periodic is defined to be a minimum of at least once every 15 minutes for the first 6 hours of detention and at least once every 30 minutes thereafter. Any minor subjected to segregation or isolation shall be visually checked at least every 15 minutes.

- (h) **Question: Are the 15 minute checks being recorded?**

Reference: Illinois County Jail Standards Section 701.270 b)9 A)B)C)

Visual checks shall be recorded by a mechanical device or logged in ink indicating,

- 1 Time of Check;
2. Signature of Person Responsible; and
3. Any relevant remarks.

- (i) **Question: Are youths being securely detained longer than 6 hours?**

Reference: Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition; Section 705ILCS 405/5-410.(2)(a)(b)(c)(d)(e)

Reference: Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention Policy Number 89-1201, Section: 223(a) (14)

State law differs with Federal Requirements.

Federal Requirements allows alleged delinquents to be detained for up to six hours for the purpose of investigation and identification. The clock starts the moment a juvenile is placed into a locked setting. This includes any locked room, or when a juvenile is cuffed to a stationary object. The period of detention is deemed to have begun once the minor has been placed in a locked room or cell or handcuffed to a stationary object..

County jails may hold minors 12 years old or older up to 12hours, 40hours and up to 7 days.

Minors being held over 6 hours are violations of the Federal Requirements.

Upon placement in secure custody in a jail or lockup, the minor shall be informed of the purpose of the detention, the time it is expected to last and the fact that it can exceed six hours.

**Monitoring staff should encourage secure holding facilities not to exceed 6 hours.**

## SECTION V

### REPORTING ON JMIS

**(a) Question: Does this facility report on JMIS**

Reference: Illinois Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards 720.130 b)1)2)

Regarding the population reports, the Chief of Police or any other responsible supervisor designated by him, shall furnish monthly reports to the Jail and Detention Standards Unit, utilizing the appropriate forms supplied by the Unit. The report shall include the total number of juvenile males and juvenile females securely detained during the month; the initials, date of birth, age, sex, and race of each juvenile; the offense and offense code for which the juvenile is being held; whether the juvenile has been adjudicated; the date and time the juvenile was securely detained; the date time the juvenile was released; and to whom the juvenile was released or transferred.

Reports shall be submitted by the tenth day following each month, including those months in which no persons were detained. Reports shall include only those persons securely detained and not those merely arrested.

**(b) Question: If so, was the JMIS data consistent with the juvenile log?**

Reference: No Reference

It is essential that the Monitor check JMIS monthly reports against lockup or jail logs to determine accuracy of JMIS reporting.

**(c) Question: Was the use of the JMIS form explained, and were blank forms left?**

Reference: No Reference

It is important to explain in detail to the agency being monitored, the use of the JMIS report. If this agency has not been provided or is presently not utilizing the JMIS report, forms should be left and explained in detail. It is important for the agencies to understand the necessity of reporting on the JMIS reports of all juveniles being securely detained.

**(d) Question: Are juvenile records prohibited from being open to public inspection or disclosure except by appropriate authority?**

Reference: Illinois Juvenile Court Act 2002 Edition, Section 705ILCS 405/1-8

Which reflects, that all juvenile court records shall not be made available to the general public but may be inspected by representatives of agencies, associations and news media or other properly interested persons by general or special order of the court. It should be noted, that the Secretary of State of whom the Clerk of the Court shall report the disposition of all cases, as required in Section 6-204 of the Illinois Vehicle Code 625ILCS 5/5-204. Information reported relative to these offenses shall be privileged and available only to the Secretary of State, Courts and Police Officers.

**(e) Question: Are status offenders entered into the juvenile detention log?**

Reference: Illinois County Jail Standards, Section 701.270(a)(4)(D) and Illinois Municipal Jail and Lockup Standards.720.150 a)4)d)

A log shall be kept that shows the offense which is the basis for the detention, reasons and circumstances for the decision to detain and the length of time that the minor was in detention. To further understand this question it shall be noted that a status offense is defined under the Illinois Juvenile Court Act 705ILCS 405/5-5(4). Except for minors accused of violation of an order of the court, any minor accused of an act under federal, state Law and municipal ordinance which would not be illegal if committed by an adult, can not be placed in a jail, municipal lockup, detention center, or secure correctional facility. To further understand, the JMIS report should only indicate the secure detention of those who are delinquent. Status offenders are not to be securely detained.

## **SECTION VI**

### **DIAGRAM**

**(a) Question: Was a diagram of the facility secured or drawn?**

Reference: No Reference

It is important to obtain a diagram or a sketch of the facility not necessarily to scale. The purpose of this is to obtain the necessary information concerning the area of interview for juveniles by the inspected agency. Upon the review of the facilities drawings, it should be important for the inspector to draw arrows indicating the path in which the juvenile is brought into the department, and the area of which the juvenile is interviewed should be labeled.

## **SECTION VII**

### **DETENTION, FACILITY TRANSFER**

**(a) Question: Which detention facility does your agency use? Please explain any problems, which exist regarding the transfer of juveniles or availability.**

Reference: No Reference

There are 17 juvenile detention facilities within the State of Illinois. Many juveniles are taken into custody and upon approval and recommendation by the county probation departments, are referred to secure detention within one of these seventeen recognized juvenile detention facilities.

At times it becomes necessary for the agencies who utilize these detention facilities, to seek outside their boundaries for other facilities that would have available space. Any problems, which exist regarding the transfer of juveniles and availability should be noted and explained in details either at the end of the question or within the comment section.

## **SECTION VIII**

### **COMMENTS**

The monitoring report needs to contain a summary of the above questions specifying whether or not violations were found, and if so, to specify the violation or violations. It is necessary also, to specify whether or not status offenders are being securely detained, and whether or not juvenile delinquent offenders are securely detained. Within the comment section it is also important to detail all changes since last inspection. An example of this would be the number of status offender's securely detained, number of juvenile offenders detained not sight, or sound separate since last inspection. Any problems noted during the inspection of either status offender records or juvenile logs should be noted as well within this section. If no violations were found, it is important to indicate the facility's full compliance.

The person being interviewed should indicate during the inspection the full process of handling juvenile status and delinquent offenders. It is important that the inspector note all pertinent information, which would reflect changes within the policy or operating procedures of the department, and list all changes that might have or will occur within the year.

## **SECTION IX**

### **CONCLUSION**

Responsibilities under the law, the Federal Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (JJDP) Act of 2002 as amended (442U.S.C.5601), was adopted by the U.S. Congress in order to establish a comprehensive nation wide policy regarding of the care and treatment of juveniles by the legal systems and the law enforcement community.

The State of Illinois receives JJDP funds and is required to comply with the mandates contained in the JJDP Act. Since Illinois receives JJDP funds and is therefore required to comply with the act, in addition the Illinois Legislature has explicitly adopted many provisions that are identical or similar to the act of the JJDP.

Where Illinois law and the Federal JJDP Act are not the same, the one that offers the most protection must be followed. This will afford the most protection against claims of improper treatment of juveniles.
