# Racial and Ethnic Demographics Data State Fiscal Year 2020 Report

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## MESSAGE FROM THE SECRETARY

Dear IDHS Customers, Stakeholders, Honorable Members of the General Assembly, and Illinois Residents,

The Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) provides Illinois residents with streamlined access to integrated services, especially to those who are striving to achieve economic independence, and to those who face multiple challenges to self-sufficiency. We seek to do this with an equity lens, ensuring equitable access to social and human services, supports, programs, and resources to enhance the lives of all the people we serve. Part of having an equity lens is collecting and analyzing information on who we are serving, and using that information to inform, when/where needed, how to extend our services to people and communities who may be underserved. Public Act 100-0275 is one tool in the toolbox that helps us achieve that.

Since January 1, 2018, [Public Act 100-0275] has required IDHS to collect and publicly report statistical data on the racial, ethnic, and demographic characteristics of program participants for each program administered by IDHS. As per Public Act 100-0275, the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) is submitting this 2020 Racial and Ethnic Demographics Data (RED) Report. In addition to racial, ethnic, and demographics data for IDHS customers, this report provides an overview of the IDHS program divisions, and the programs and services IDHS offers. This report also highlights some of the challenges and successes associated with this data collection process.

IDHS serves millions of customers across five program divisions --Developmental Disabilities; Family and Community Services; Mental Health; Rehabilitation Services; and Substance Use Prevention and Recovery. IDHS program divisions collect data for different programs in different ways, but are largely guided by individual program guidelines. This means that there is no standard, department-wide data collection process. Additionally, IDHS uses multiple data collection systems that are often antiquated and that are not designed to work together. Having no standard data collection process and no department-wide data collection and analysis system has resulted in a series of challenges that has impacted the timeliness of this report. Despite these challenges, IDHS is committed to meeting both the spirit and the letter of this mandate, and to confronting and mitigating these challenges to improve our data gathering efforts. We will work on short-term improvements to our data gathering strategies, while also working on longer-term data collection and management solutions.

IDHS understands and supports the intent of this legislative requirement, and we are committed to developing short-term and long-term data collection strategies, policies, and practices that align with overarching efforts of other state agencies and the Office of the Governor to gather and report this information. We recognize that RED data will help us to quantify disparities and to inform our improvement efforts. It will also help us track the evolving human services needs of different communities and populations. Acknowledging our internal data collection challenges, we are providing this preliminary report, although it only provides a partial picture of our customer population. We recognize this falls short of the stated data collection requirements, but are providing this information as a first step in the right direction.

As we embark on the journey of enhanced data collection and accountability amidst the shifting landscape of human services, we invite you to periodically visit this website as additional RED data will

be analyzed and reported on a yearly (fiscal year) basis. We deeply appreciate your continued support.

# Section 1: INTRODUCTION

## Purpose

Public Act 100-275 requires IDHS to collect and report ethnic and racial demographic data across all divisions and programs. Given IDHS's commitment to building an equitable system for all people of Illinois, data collection is one step in a process that helps us to understand who is accessing IDHS services and where those services are being provided. Ideally, further analysis of this data, coupled with general population data, will help us to see what populations are represented in our service population, and whether there are groups that are underrepresented. This will begin to provide a roadmap for how we can ensure equitable access to IDHS services and supports. IDHS manages multiple divisions and programs, including an array of federal grants that have various reporting structures and requirements. Despite the various complexities and challenges associated with those differences, IDHS is committed to building robust and transparent data reporting systems.

## Background

Public Act 100-275 was signed in August 2017 with an effective date of January 1, 2018. The State law requires IDHS to collect and publicly report statistical data on the racial and ethnic demographics of program participants for each program administered by the Department. The law provides a list of required classifications, but (1) allows IDHS to further define, by rule, the classifications to be used and (2) allows IDHS programs that are subject to federal reporting requirements may use federal classifications, if they differ from those specified in the Act. IDHS is required to post this racial and ethnic information on the IDHS website. The following is the text of P.A. 100-0275:

AN ACT concerning State government.

**Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,**

**represented in the General Assembly:**

Section 5. The Department of Human Services Act is amended

by adding Section 1-70 as follows:

(20 ILCS 1305/1-70 new)

Sec. 1-70. Uniform demographic data collection.

(a) The Department shall collect and publicly report statistical data on the racial and ethnic demographics of program participants for each program administered by the Department. Except as provided in subsection (b), when collecting the data required under this Section, the Department shall use the same racial and ethnic classifications for each program which shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

- (1) American Indian and Alaska Native alone.
- (2) Asian alone.
- (3) Black or African American alone.
- (4) Hispanic or Latino of any race.
- (5) Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander alone.

- (6) White alone.
- (7) Some other race alone.
- (8) Two or more races.

The Department may further define, by rule, the racial and ethnic classifications provided in this Section.

(b) If a program administered by the Department is subject to federal reporting requirements that include the collection and public reporting of statistical data on the racial and ethnic demographics of program participants, the Department may maintain the same racial and ethnic classifications used under the federal requirements if such classifications differ from the classifications listed in subsection (a).

(c) The Department shall make all demographic information collected under this Section available to the public which at a minimum shall include posting the information for each program in a timely manner on the Department's official website. If the Department already has a mechanism or process in place to report information about program participation for any program administered by the Department, then the Department shall use that mechanism or process to include the demographic information collected under this Section. If the Department does not have a mechanism or process in place to report information about program participation for any program administered by the Department, then the Department shall create a mechanism or process to disseminate the demographic information collected under this Section.

### **Data Collection Efforts**

Complete and consistent data collection and analysis is integral to fair and effective service provision, and also an important part of the work of advancing equity and racial justice. To ensure equity in access and equity in outcomes, IDHS must have a reliable set of data and information. IDHS is committed to reviewing and overhauling the current internal process to reflect a more universal standard of data collection and reporting, and to ensure compliance with PA 101-0654. Additionally, IDHS will work with external partners who collect data on behalf of the Department to make sure they align their data gathering processes with IDHS internal efforts and requirements.

### **Challenges to Address:**

- Lack of universal intake document or process
- Lack of standard, agency-wide reporting system
- Competing federal data collection requirements and restrictions
- Lack of accurate way to collect complete race data for smaller racial and ethnic groups
- Duplicated counts for race and ethnicity (i.e., reporting ethnicity as Hispanic and race as Black)
- Duplicated counts across programs and program Divisions
- Inconsistent data gathering among external partners (i.e., other state agencies, community providers/partners)
- Limited technical resources

The two largest IDHS programs are Medicaid and SNAP, which combined serve over 5,000,000 people. Many of these customers are also accessing additional IDHS programs, *which results in duplicated counts across Divisions and programs.*

### **Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion**

IDHS, like many state agencies, has crafted a diversity, equity, and inclusion plan under the guidance of the Governor’s Office. The Plan encompasses all offices and divisions of IDHS and reflects a strategic and iterative process to pursue equity and racial justice collectively and collaboratively. Our goal is to operate with an understanding of equity and racial justice that ensures equity in access to IDHS services and supports, and equity in outcomes for the communities relying on those supports. Part of the work of achieving this goal involves the collection of accurate and complete data on all IDHS programs, including racial and ethnic demographic data. So, while this data collection process will ultimately satisfy the terms of PA 100-125, it will also be used to inform how IDHS staff works to ensure equity in access to IDHS programs, and our ability to track outcomes.

Moving forward, IDHS will continue to:

- Work on internal data gathering standards;
- Implement data gathering standards internally and with community partners on new reporting requirements;
- Determine potential additional data points;
- Coordinate with other state agencies to identify and secure needed information.

## Section 2: PROGRAM DIVISIONS

IDHS has five program divisions that serve the communities of the state of Illinois. Please find below a summary of their work, highlights of customer data, and plans for a more robust data gathering process.

### Developmental Disabilities

#### **Mission Statement:**

The Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) supports individuals with developmental disabilities (DD) to attain their wants, needs, and dreams through being competitively employed, making decisions, contributing to the community, ensuring health and safety, and relationships with family and friends. The Division believes in opportunities for those being served so they can maximize control over their life choices and achieve personal success.

#### **Description:**

The Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) provides an extensive array of services and supports to individuals with developmental disabilities. The developmental disability service system includes seven State Operated Developmental Centers (SODC), 328 community service providers, and approximately 218 private Intermediate Care Facilities. Additionally, DDD manages three Home and Community Based Medicaid waivers: Adult Waiver, Children's Residential Waiver, and Children's Support Waiver. While the DDD operates these programs, the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) is responsible for being the official administrator of these programs with federal Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services, which partially funds these programs. This means that HFS is responsible for collecting and holding data pertaining to service delivery. The DDD will collect demographics data annually from HFS for reporting.

#### **Data Collection Processes:**

- DDD and HFS collects data on DDD customers from the seven State Operated Developmental Centers. This represents 4% of their total customers.
- HFS collects data on DDD customers covered by the three Home and Community Based Waivers, and customers in the private Intermediate Care Facilities. This represents 73% of their total customers.
- HFS also collects data on DDD grant funded programs but were unable to produce the data for us in time for this report. DDD will collect this data for subsequent reports.

# Family and Community Services

## **Mission Statement:**

The Division of Family and Community Services (DFCS) improves the health and well-being of families and individuals through partnerships and services that enhance the lives of Illinoisians.

## **Description:**

The Division of Family and Community Services (DFCS) is the largest program Division at IDHS and takes a comprehensive approach to meeting the most basic needs of Illinois residents and provides a suite of basic supports to residents including, access to food; nutrition education; medical needs; prenatal care; housing assistance; quality child care; youth services; income assistance; employment and training; immigrant and refugee services; and other supportive services, helping to ensure a safety net for vulnerable populations throughout the State. Additionally, DFCS has local offices across the state known as the Family and Community Resource Centers, which provide many services and information.

## **Data Collection Processes:**

There were 89 active DFCS programs in SFY20, with uneven data collection across programs. The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Medicaid and the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program applications are the primary source for collecting racial and ethnic data through the Integrated Eligibility System (IES).

The Office of Workforce Development will begin extracting racial and ethnic data from the Integrated Eligibility System for the purposes of reporting data on all its programs (SNAP Earnfare, SNAP Employment and Training programs and services, SNAP Job Placement with Retention, SNAP Special Project, and the TANF Employment and Training projects.

The Office of Early Childhood, which includes the All Our Kids program and the Child Care Assistance Program, is working with the Department of Information Technology to create a database for their data collection and reporting processes.

The Office of Family Wellness includes the Maternal and Child Health programs High-Risk Infant Follow-Up and Better Birth Outcomes, which both collect race, ethnic, and demographic data. SNAP Outreach and SNAP/WIC Statewide Outreach (Hunger Hotline) are two more programs in this office, and services are delivered by community partners who will begin collecting and reporting this data for the third quarter of the 2021 fiscal year. Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) programs (SNAP WIC Breastfeeding Peer Counseling Program, SNAP/WIC Food Center, and WIC Food Center Farmers Market) are all in varying stages of building out and/or creating data collection systems and/or processes.

Other offices and programs will all be implementing a plan to collect race and ethnicity data, including:

- Adult Services and Basic Supports (including Maternal and Child Health programs, Family Case Management, the Emergency Food Assistance Program, and SNAP Outreach and Earnfare programs)
- Community and Positive Youth Development
- Illinois Welcoming Centers

For the remaining programs currently challenged with collecting complete racial, ethnic, and demographic data, DFCS is putting systems in place for SFY22, as permitted by federal rules; for these programs DFCS is creating new systems/processes for data collection. These programs include:

- Emergency and Transitional Housing
- Emergency Solutions Grant
- Supportive Housing
- Child Care Resource and Referral Program - Child Care Assistance (including Statewide CC&C and Provider Supports and Services)
- Domestic Violence Prevention Intervention
- Homeless Prevention
- Leadership Training and Tiered Reimbursement
- Partner Abuse Intervention
- Sexual Assault Prevention and Response
- Title XX DFI

For any programs currently challenged with collecting complete racial, ethnic, and demographic data, DFCS is putting systems in place for SFY22, as permitted by federal rules; for these programs DFCS is creating new systems/processes for data collection.

DFCS will also continue to collaborate with community partners to ensure race, ethnic, and demographic data is collected.

Program participant duplication is a result of one person or family having participated in more than one program and received more than one FCS service. Individuals will be counted in each of these programs as a customer, and potentially as a customer receiving services in other Divisions.

# Mental Health

## **Mission Statement:**

To ensure equitable access to a full continuum of preventive, supportive, and recovery-focused treatment resources that promote equitable outcomes and mental wellness for all people in Illinois.

## **Description:**

As the State Mental Health Authority (SMHA), the Division of Mental Health (DMH) is responsible for assuring that children, adolescents, and adults throughout Illinois have the availability of and access to public-funded mental health services. Service delivery in DMH is provided within five geographically organized service regions. This service delivery is provided through approximately 200 community mental health centers/agencies and seven State Operated Psychiatric Hospitals, the latter containing both civil and forensic beds. The DMH also provides statutorily required treatment services for sexually violent persons through its Treatment and Detention Facility.

## **Data Collection Processes:**

The DMH provides access to both services and programs. Services are provided to an individual and billed to IDHS/DMH through Medicaid Fee For Service claims. Programs are contractually defined and can be paid from a multitude of appropriation streams. Typically, these are referred to as Grant Programs.

The services data is based solely on DMH/SMHA claims data (Medicaid Fee-for-Service) and does not include claims data for individuals treated in the public system whose claims are processed by Managed Care Organizations (MCO). The DMH/SMHA is currently working to get data from the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS), the State Medicaid Authority on Managed Care claims to better encompass the total individuals treated in the publicly funded system.

Note: Medicaid Fee-for-Service claim data is not complete until six months after the end of the fiscal year; this is a result of the Illinois Smart Act which allows providers 180 days from the date of service to file a claim.

Each program collects a separate set of data consistent with the deliverables outlined in the contract exhibit for the program. Individual consumer level detail is not collected for these programs due to constant changes in program existence as well as annual changes in the program measures.

Collecting complete racial and ethnic demographics data collection is a challenge due to the lack of a standard policy for collecting this data from the 200+ community mental health providers and other grantees, and from the state operated psychiatric hospitals. In addition, outdated technology and an antiquated data management system prevent us from collecting and analyzing the data efficiently.

While DMH may be able to require racial and ethnic demographics from our providers, the Division cannot easily update their technology or CRM systems because they are linked to IDHS procurement and technology management. To address these challenges DMH will begin to examine their data collection

policies and begin working to design a comprehensive strategy for collecting and analyzing racial and ethnic demographics to inform programs and services.

# Rehabilitation Services

## **Mission Statement:**

The Illinois Department of Human Services, Division of Rehabilitation Services (DRS) is the state's lead agency serving individuals with disabilities. DRS works in partnership with people with disabilities and their families to assist them in making informed choices to achieve full community participation through employment, education, and independent living opportunities.

## **Description:**

DRS assists individuals with disabilities and their families in overcoming the many barriers people with disabilities may face in achieving full community participation. Through informed choice and a network of wraparound services, DRS provides the skills and training needed for individuals with disabilities to achieve their educational, career, and independent living goals. DRS provides Disability Determination Services for individuals seeking Social Security Benefits and Benefits Planning to aid customers in navigating the rules governing SSA recipients who wish to pursue employment. The Division's organizational structure includes the major bureaus of: Bureau of Field Services, Bureau of Blind Services, Bureau of Home Services, and Bureau of Disability Determination Services. In addition to those bureaus, DRS provides specialized services for Blind Illinoisans or people with low vision, Deaf or Hard of Hearing, and Individuals with Disabilities who are Latino or Hispanic.

## **Data Collection Processes:**

The Division of Rehabilitation Services administers programs with differing regulatory oversight, and in some instances are required to adhere to the practices outlined by the Social Security Administration, which does not allow the collection of race or ethnic data (roughly 73% of all customers). DRS continues to make the expansion of data collection and analysis a priority and works to ensure all services are provided with an equity lens. As a standard practice, DRS aligns data collection designations with the Federal Department of Education Rehabilitation Services Administration.

- DRS collects data on customers in the Vocational Rehabilitation program, Home Services Program, Independent Living program, Older-Blind (VR/Title-IV)
- DRS collects data on customers served by the three state schools (through the Illinois State Board of Education SIS system).
- There are data collection restrictions on roughly 73% of DRS customers (primarily the Bureau of Disability Determination Services).

# Substance Use Prevention and Recovery

## **Mission Statement:**

The mission of the Division of Substance Use Prevention and Recovery (SUPR) is to provide a recovery oriented system of care along the continuum of prevention, intervention, treatment and recovery support where individuals with SUD, those in recovery and those at risk are valued and treated with dignity and where stigma, accompanying attitudes, discrimination, and other barriers to recovery are eliminated.

## **Description:**

The Division of Substance Use Prevention and Recovery is charged with designing, and coordinating a comprehensive and coordinated community-based and culturally and gender-appropriate array of services throughout the state for the prevention, harm reduction, intervention, treatment and rehabilitation of alcohol and other related disorders. This system addresses the needs of at-risk individuals and/or individuals with Substance Use Disorder and their families.

As the single state authority for Substance Use Disorder (SUD) in Illinois, SUPR is primarily responsible for providing prevention, harm reduction, intervention and treatment services related to alcohol, tobacco and other drugs to Illinois residents. Such services are supported through a combination of state and federal funds. The treatment delivery system is designed to provide screening, assessment, customer-treatment matching, referral, intervention, treatment and continuing care services for people with SUDs. These services are provided by numerous community-based SUD treatment organizations contracted by SUPR according to the needs of various communities and populations.

## **Data Collection Processes:**

Data collection across SUPR programs varies significantly. The largest SUPR program uses a State of Illinois proprietary software system to collect data. Because this system is used by providers to submit claims for payment, and because race and ethnicity are two of the required fields, the data collected is estimated to be 99% accurate.

Data for the remaining SUPR programs is largely collected and maintained by external vendors, and is specific to each program. There is currently no method to organize, centralize, or standardize data for these vendors. SUPR is working to centralize data collected from these programs into one enterprise data warehouse system, but as with the other program Divisions, are challenged with limited technical resources. With the necessary resources in place, SUPR should have the capacity to provide complete data by SFY23.

There are a limited number of programs that do not require 100% data collection. For example, people accessing substance use disorder resources through the Illinois Helpline for Opioids and Other Substances may elect not to provide any demographic data, including racial and ethnic information. This also occurs with the Substance Use Prevention program.
